Call to Order

Chairman Rob Johnson called the meeting to order at 2:09 p.m.

Pledge of Allegiance

The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Commissioner Joe Carchio.

Roll Call

Roll call was conducted by the Commission Clerk.

Chairman's Report

Chairman Johnson presented immediate past Chairman, Joe Carchio with a certificate of appreciation for his service as chairman of the Commission in 2017. Chairman Johnson also bid farewell to Commissioner Steve Lodge, who is leaving the commission. He showed commissioners the plaque that staff will send to Steve, who could not be present. Four commissioners were congratulated on their leadership positions on their respective city councils: Mayors Chad Wanke (Placentia) and David Shawver (Stanton), and Mayors pro tem Christine Marick (Brea) and Cynthia Conners (Laguna Woods).

Director's Report

Director Tom Koutroulis thanked Chairman Johnson and Vice Chair Froelich for accepting their respective leadership roles. He noted that the focus of the department is laying the foundation for a regional response to state mandates. He also announced that the first major step for the Organics Initiative was to launch pilot composting programs at all three sites. Director Koutroulis will be presenting information on the Initiative to City Managers on April 4.

Director Koutroulis also mentioned the retirement of Commission Clerk, Julie Chay at the end of March and thanked her for her service to the Commission.

Clerk's Action Item Report

The clerk noted that paper agendas were not mailed to commissioners, and that the snail mail copies would no longer be sent. However, paper copies of the agenda will be placed in Commissioners' folders to be available at the meeting. Commissioners who wish to continue to receive paper copies mailed should contact the clerk.

The clerk also reviewed the procedure for completing the Ethics Training and encouraged Commissioners to do so in April.

Agenda Item 2: OC Waste & Recycling FY 2016/17 Financial Report

Interim Budget Manager Karalyn Meeh presented the report. Commissioner Shawver asked how many years out OCWR projects for capital improvement projects, and what will happen post-AB 1383. Staff responded that the legislation will ratchet down tonnage. They added that the department's focus is on best available technologies. It the future we will likely offer services we don't currently offer.

Business Planning & Support Manager Isabel Rios-Kahn reported on the Board of Supervisors' approval of the Regional Recycling and Waste Reduction grants. In response to a commissioner's question, Ms. Rios-Kahn clarified that the Discovery Cube's grant is in addition to the Eco Challenge Exhibit and is for educational outreach.

Strategic Communications Manager Ruth Wardwell noted the upcoming Earth Day Open House at the Prima Deshecha Landfill and other educational outreach and diversion-focused activities.

Contract & Program Support Manager Brian Probolsky mentioned the addition of Commissioners Alvarez and Plumlee to the Legislation and Regulations Committee and reported on current regulations and legislation.

Mike Learakos, Executive Director of Waste Not OC, made a presentation about the Waste Not OC Coalition and its work toward eliminating hunger and reducing food waste.

Agenda Item 2-OC Waste & Recycling's FY 17/18 Financial Report Karalyn Meeh, Section Manager, Budget, Purchasing & Landfill Administration

This report presents the financial status of OC Waste & Recycling as of the third quarter of FY 17/18 (ending March 31, 2018). Included in the report is financial information related to tonnage, expenditures, revenues, and cash balances.

System Tonnage

Total OC Waste & Recycling system tonnage received as of the third quarter of FY 17/18 was 3,707,112 tons, consisting of 2,363,363 in-county tonnage and 1,343,749 importation tonnage. In-county tonnage has risen by 3.8% from the third quarter last fiscal year. Importation tonnage has increased by 3.4%. By landfill site, tonnage as of March 31, 2018 was as follows:

Olinda Alpha Landfill

In-county tonnage 892,149 (38% of total in-county tonnage)
Importation tonnage 669,790 (50% of total importation tonnage)

Frank R. Bowerman Landfill

In-county tonnage 1,161,494 (49%) Importation tonnage 594,249 (44%)

Prima Deshecha Landfill

In-county tonnage 309,720 (13%) Importation tonnage 79,710 (6%)

Revenues

As of the third quarter of FY 17/18, revenue recorded in OC Waste & Recycling's Enterprise/Operating (Fund 299) was \$79,182,926 versus the modified revenue budget of \$135,340,116. Primary sources of revenue received through the third quarter of FY 17/18 included:

- \$75,916,933 Disposal Fees & Services (95.9% of total revenue received)
- \$2,486,159 Leases & Royalties (3.1%)
- \$1,430,183 Interest Income (1.8%)

For FY 17/18, revenue recorded in OC Waste & Recycling's Capital Project Fund (Fund 273) was \$40,189,972 or 77.3% versus the modified revenue budget of \$51,964,000. Revenue received through the third quarter of FY 17/18 includes interest earnings of \$189,972 and a transfer in of \$40,000,000 from Fund 299. The primary source of revenue for Fund 273 is from internal transfers from OC Waste & Recycling's Enterprise/Operating (Fund 299).

Expenditures

FY 17/18 expenditures and encumbrances recorded in OC Waste & Recycling's Enterprise/Operating (Fund 299) as of March 31, 2018 totaled \$ 125,399,957, 69.0% of the modified expense budget of \$181,730,804.

FY 17/18 expenditures and encumbrances recorded in OC Waste & Recycling's Capital Project Fund (Fund 273) as of March 31, 2018 totaled \$32,472,362, 48.5% of the modified expense budget of \$66,947,576.

As of March 31, 2018, OC Waste & Recycling's categories of major expenditures were:

- \$41.6M Services & Supplies (33.6%)
- \$32.4M Capital Project (26.1%)
- \$20.0M Salaries & Employee Benefits (26.1%)
- \$12.6M Equipment & Tangible Assets (10.2%)
- \$17.2M Other (13.9%)

Cash Balance and Reserves

As of March 31, 2018, the OC Waste & Recycling's Enterprise/Operating Fund 299 had a cash balance of \$157,352,721.

As of March 31, 2018, the OC Waste & Recycling's Enterprise/Operating Fund 299 had an available reserves balance of \$70,441,586.

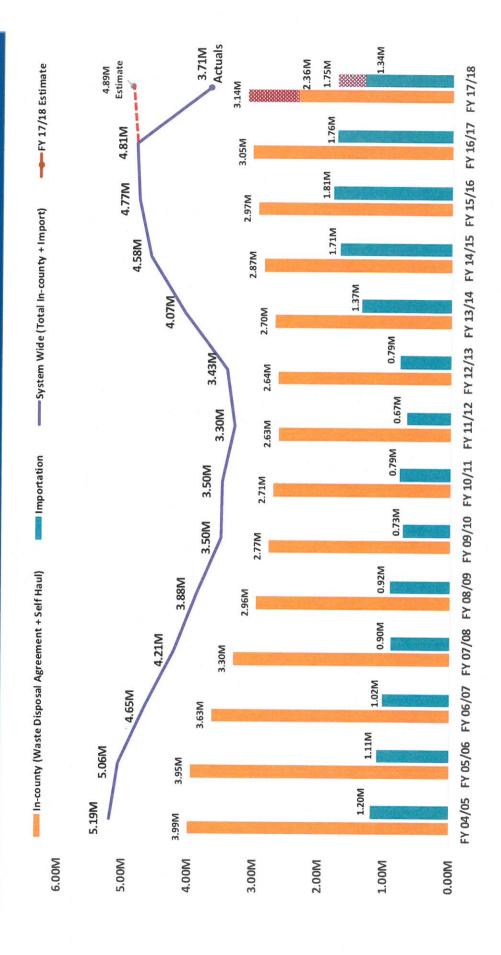

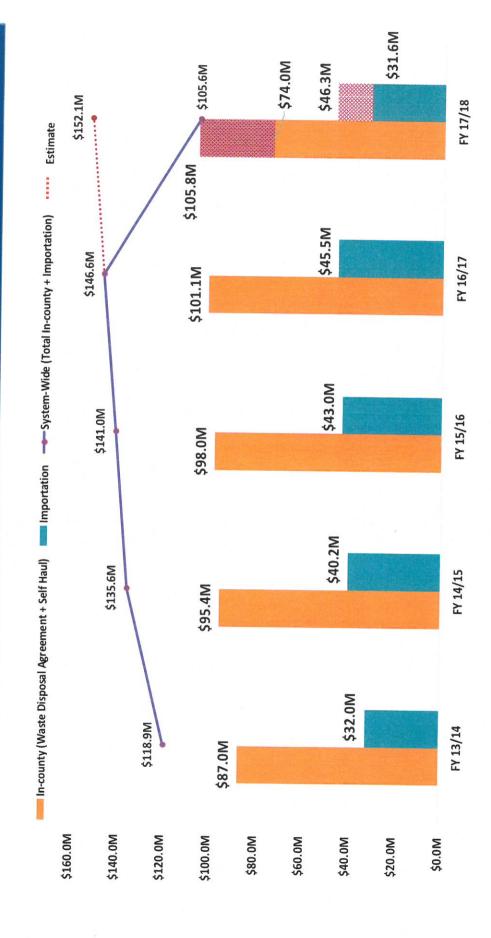

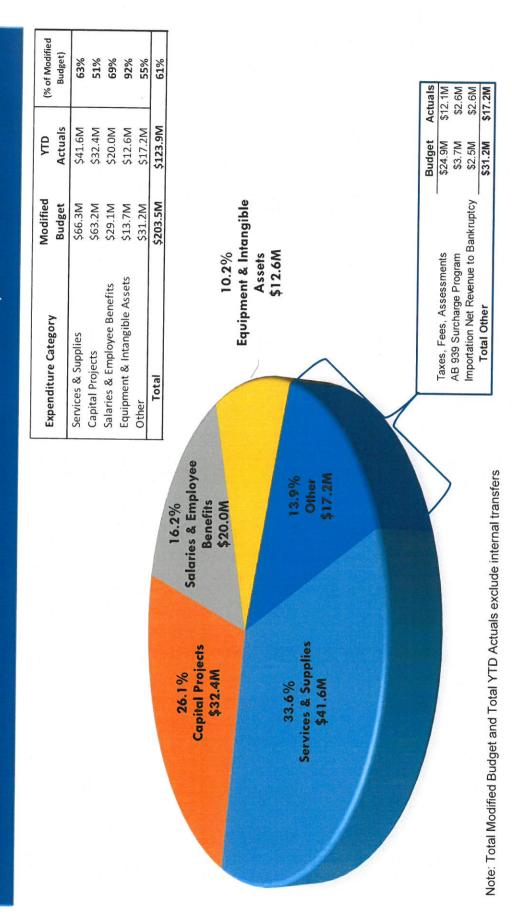
